The History of Manor Park—Part 1 (Malcolm Macdonald)

MANOR PARK

In the first of a series for the newsletter, individual streets are examined to see who first lived in the houses of Manor Park. Old Manor (Assaye Place, Canada Crescent, Willowglen Road and one side of Macaulay Road was erected by Stornoway Town Council and tenants moved in prior to hostilities in 1939. New Manor (the other side of Macaulay Road, Portrona Drive, Morison Avenue, Macleod Road, Perceval Road South, Bain Square, Queensland Road, India Street and Torquil Terrace, were all built and occupied after the Second World War.

Up until 1945 the houses in Old Manor were numbered together with no street names. The tenants in 1945 with the old Manor Park numbers in brackets were:

Tenants & Residents Meetings -

Across the Western Isles there are three formal registered tenants and residents groups: one working across the Western Isles (chaired By Maree Hoy), one in Benbecula, (chaired by Roddy Mackay) and the Cearns Residents Association, (chaired by Barney Mackay). There are also several local groups, sometimes referred to as village voices. Tenants and Residents groups can and do make a difference to the service provided to tenants by working together and raising issues, collectively. HHP is legally required to consult with the tenants groups on issues that affect tenants.

Tenants' Panel/Register

The panel/register provides a tenant's voice to make your views known on, for example, housing polices and service standards. HHP will regularly consult with and involve tenants on the register over a variety of housing issues. This can be by phone, post, e-mail or group sessions.

The Panel/Register contains contact details of tenants who would like to be consulted on issues they are particularly interested in.

Reading Panel

HHP want you to be involved in helping us make sure our information is clear and user-friendly. It is important that we are using the right words, in the right way, to get our message across. To help make sure that we are communicating as best we can - we want to set up a tenants reading panel. The purpose of a reading panel is to allow tenants to examine and comment upon printed material produced by us before publication.

Working Groups

These provide tenants with a 'hands on' option of developing new services or policies. Working groups are attended by both tenants and staff members. You will be paid a fee to cover their time and expenses.

Focus Groups

Focus groups provide opportunities to have their say on aspects of policy or service and are usually a one off meeting. They provide good information to HHP on how you see the organisation and the services it delivers. You will be paid a fee to cover their time and expenses.

Tenant Led Inspections

You will be involved in reviewing your housing services. You will be given training on policies and procedures and then use a variety of different methods to 'test' services, with the support of staff.

Estate Inspections

HHP inspect housing estates on an annual cycle and involve tenants in this process. The purpose of these inspections is to look at the overall appearance of each estate, including open spaces.

COOKS CORNER

Lamb Loin with Rocket, New Potatoes & Salsa Ingredients

- 1 x 4kg/8lb 13oz pumpkin
- 125g/4oz <u>butter</u>
- 2 medium onions, peeled, finely chopped
- 1 cinnamon stick
- freshly grated <u>nutmeg</u>
- salt and freshly ground <u>black pepper</u>
- 1.7 litres/3 pints chicken stock (vegetarians may substitute <u>vegetable stock</u>)
- 3 tablespoons sherry

Method

Heat the oven to 180C.

Boil the potatoes in salted water for 15-20 mins until just tender. Drain and keep warm. Top & tail and blanch the beans for 1 min.

Meanwhile, heat a frying pan, add a tbsp of oil. Season the lamb and brown all over in the pan. Reduce the heat and add the butter, basting the meat for 1 min. Transfer to an oven tray and cook in the oven for 6-8 mins. Remove and rest the meat for 5-10 mins.

Reheat the pan and stir fry the blanched beans. Keep warm.

Blend all the salsa ingredients in the food processor. Don't make it too far ahead. Halve the potatoes and place in a bowl with the warm beans, pan & meat juices, parsley and a little oil. Season and mix.

Divide between 4 plates with slices of lamb. Top with rocket tossed in oil and spoon the salsa around.
